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ROWLAND JUDD was born about 1728,² possibly in England;³ died after 1805, probably in Wilkes County, North Carolina.⁴ The name of Rowland's wife is unknown.

On 15 September 1745, a Rowland Judd indentured himself to Thomas Stammers of Philadelphia County for four years.⁵ In 1767, a Rowland Judd and Nathaniel Judd were living together in Pittsylvania County, Virginia.⁶

In the 1770s, a Rowland Judd was in Surry County, North Carolina, and then in 1778, he was in Wilkes County, North Carolina, when it was formed from Surry County, North Carolina.

Rowland Judd was one of seven men appointed commissioner of Wilkes County by the general assembly of the State of North Carolina in 1778. The commissioners were “invested with full Power and authority to agree and contract with workmen to build a courthouse, prison, and stocks in any part of the county where they may think the most proper and convenient.”⁷

Five-year-old Joseph Cartwright, son of Joseph Cartwright, deceased, was apprenticed in March 1779 to Rowland to become a farmer.⁸ Joseph Cartwright, along with Rowland and John Judd, witnessed a deed between Rowland Judd Jr. and Nathaniel Judd in March 1795.⁹

In October 1782, Rowland received a land grant from the State of North Carolina for 515¼ acres in Wilkes County on the south and middle fork of the Reddies Rivers; the price was fifty shillings for every one hundred acres.¹⁰

For the purpose of collecting taxes, Wilkes County was divided into militia districts. As early as 1782, Rowland Judd was made captain of the sixth militia district, which included the area around the Reddies River. Rowland collected taxes through 1789.¹¹

Rowland Judd, referred to as “esquire” in Wilkes County, North Carolina, records, sold 63¾ acres in Wilkes County to Rowland Judd Jr. in January 1788 for forty pounds.¹² In November 1788, Rowland acquired 320 acres of land in Wilkes County on the waters of New River from George Wheatly Sr. Rowland paid for the land in horses (the number and value not stated in the deed).¹³ Rowland purchased twenty-five acres of land on both sides of the Reddies River from the State of North Carolina in 1794,¹⁴ which he later sold to John Judd, possibly his son, in May of 1801.¹⁵ Rowland also sold land to Nathaniel Judd in 1788¹⁶ and James Shepard in 1794.¹⁷ Sometime before February 1800, Rowland had built a gristmill on the middle fork of the Reddies River.¹⁸

In 1790, "Rollin" Judd was enumerated in the federal census with three males 16 and over (possibly Joseph Cartwright, John Judd, and Rowland), and one female (unknown).¹⁹

In November 1798 Rowland was appointed to a road jury to view a road from Puncheon Camp to the old fields on New River. The road jury was to make a report at the next court session.²⁰ Then on 4 May 1799, Rowland was appointed one of the justices for Wilkes County to take in lists of the taxable property. Rowland was the justice for Capt. M. Grady's District.²¹ Rowland returned the list to the court 31 July 1799.²² He was one of three justices present for the Wilkes County Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions in February and May of 1799 and several times during the year 1800.²³

In 1800, "Roland" Judd was enumerated in the federal census with one male 16-26 (unknown, could be Joseph Cartwright, Rowland's ward), one male 45 and over (Rowland), and one female 45 and over (unknown).²⁴

Evidently, some kind of lawsuit was brought against Rowland Judd, possibly by James Reynolds in January 1798. The court ordered that goods, chattel, and land belonging to Rowland be sold in order to pay forty-four pounds, nine shillings, and five pence. In November 1801, Wilkes County Sheriff Richard Allen sold eighty-two acres of Rowland's land to pay the above amount.²⁵

On 7 November 1801, the court ordered that Rowland Judd, Jesse Franklin, and William Lenior appear at the next court and show cause why judgment shall not be entered against them for county taxes for the years 1786 and 1787 as sureties of William Nall, sheriff for the said years.²⁶

The following are believed to be the children of Rowland Judd, although there is no documented evidence. No estate record was found for Rowland Judd in Wilkes County, North Carolina.

Probable children of Rowland Judd:

- i. ROWLAND JUDD, b. about 1763;²⁷ d. between 27 February 1824 and 5 April 1824, Adair County, Kentucky;²⁸ m. August 1789, Wilkes County, North Carolina, PHANNEY MULLIN.²⁹ Children: Hiram, Nathan, and Sally (m. Mr. Pendleton).³⁰ In 1800, Roland Judd was enumerated in the

federal census in Morgan, Wilkes County, North Carolina, with two males 10–16 (Hiram and Nathan), one male 26–45 (Roland), and one female under 10 (Sally), one female 26–45 (Phanney).³¹

- ii. ROBERT JUDD, b. about 1765.³²
- iii. JOHN JUDD, b. around 1768; m. POLLY — .

JOHN¹ JUDD was born around 1768;³³ died by 24 January 1824 in Adair County, Kentucky.

John married possibly in North Carolina, POLLY — .³⁴ She was born between 1775 and 1784;³⁵ died after 1840³⁶ and before 18 August 1841,³⁷ probably Adair County, Kentucky.

When John was only about twelve years old, he and his older brother Rowland Judd Jr. were in the militia with Col. Cleveland at the Battle of King's Mountain. On 4 October 1780, they were part of the militia drawn from several counties, including Wilkes County, North Carolina.³⁸

After the Battle of King's Mountain, John and Rowland returned to Wilkes County. There were two men named John Judd living in Wilkes County at the same time, who undoubtedly were related. The two men are distinguishable because only one could sign his name. The John Judd who could not sign his name is more than likely the son of Rowland Judd, esquire, and was the elder of the two men named John Judd. John the elder first appeared in county records in December 1786, when at about eighteen years of age, he witnessed a deed between William Tyree, possibly a neighbor, and William Colvard Jr.³⁹ On 4 May 1801, Rowland Judd Sr. sold to John Judd for \$25 twenty-five acres on both sides of Reddies River in Wilkes County, beginning in Tirey's/Tyree line.⁴⁰ John then sold these twenty-five acres to Nathaniel Judd for \$25 in July 1805.⁴¹

By 1806 John, along with his brother Rowland and nephew Nathan, were living in Adair County, Kentucky.⁴² John purchased 200 acres of land there along Sulphur Fork in 1807.⁴³

John Judd and his family were enumerated in the 1810 federal census in Adair County, Kentucky. The household included two males under 10 (Luther and Nathan), two males 10–16 (Squire and Joseph), one male 26–45 (John), one female under 10 (Kesiah), one female 16–26 (Batress/Beatrice), and one female 26–45 (Polly).⁴⁴

In September 1812, John apprenticed his son Squire for a term of three years to George L. Miller to learn the shoe and boot making business.⁴⁵ John's nephew Nathan Judd died in 1810 and included in his inventory were shoemaker's tools.⁴⁶ Then in May 1823, John apprenticed his son Nathan, not quite sixteen, to John Anderson of Columbus, Kentucky. Nathan's apprenticeship was to extend until he was twenty, and he was to learn the "art and mystery" of tanning and currying leather and to attend school.⁴⁷

In 1820, John "Jud" was again enumerated in Adair County with three males under 10 (Robert, John, and Jackson), one male 10–16 (Nathan), one male 16–18 (Luther), one male 16–26 (possibly Luther counted a second time as both Squire and Joseph were enumerated in their own households), one male 45 and over (John), one female under 10 (unknown), two females 16–26 (Kesiah and Batress/Beatrice), and one female 26–45 (Polly).⁴⁸

On 13 September 1823, while he lay sick, Luther Judd, John and Polly's son, made a nuncupative will in which he bequeath to his mother "all his property of every kind." There to witness his verbal will were his aunt and uncle, Rowland and Phanny Judd, and his sister Batress Genrty. Less than a month later, on 4 October 1823, Luther's will was filed for probate in the Adair County, Kentucky, court.⁴⁹

John died before 18 October 1823 when an inventory of his estate was made. The inventory included one table, six chairs, one armchair, one chest, and one bureau. Livestock included eighteen hogs, one cow, one calf, eleven geese, one roan colt and one bay colt; other items were two spinning wheels, a

hand mill, one saddle and bridle, one pack saddle, one saw and sickle, and one sleigh.⁵⁰ Polly bought several items in the inventory sale.⁵¹

In February 1830, Polly for “natural love and affection,” which she had for her sons Nathan, Robert, and Jackson, gave them numerous items, including three feather beds and furniture, one bureau, one table and eight chairs, hogs, sheep, geese, and one eight-year-old bay mare. She also gave them a flax wheel, kettles, and farming utensils. They were to receive these items only after her death.⁵²

Polly was living in Adair County, Kentucky, with son Jackson Judd, who was single, in 1840.⁵³ On 18 August 1841, Squire Judd and his wife, Sally; Batress and her husband, Oliver Gentry; Nathan Judd and his wife, Rebecca; Cuzzy and her husband, Joseph Curry; Robert Judd and his wife, Malinda; John Judd and his wife, Sally; and Jackson Judd sold their father’s 200 acres to their brother Joseph Judd. Joseph was to pay each of his siblings \$10.⁵⁴

Children of John and Polly (–) Judd:

- i. SQUIRE JUDD, b. 1796, North Carolina;⁵⁵ m. 3 February 1818 (1819?), Adair County, Kentucky, SALLY SHEPHERD.⁵⁶ In 1850, Squire and “Sarah” were enumerated in the federal census in Adair County, Kentucky. He was fifty-four, born in North Carolina. She was forty-seven, born in North Carolina. Also in their household, all born in Kentucky, were Marion (eighteen), Sarah (sixteen), Napoleon (fourteen), Hamilton (twelve), William (ten), Elizabeth (eight), and Winfield (two).⁵⁷
- ii. JOSEPH JUDD, b. 1798, North Carolina;⁵⁸ m. 26 November 1819 in Adair County, Kentucky, NANCY CORNWELL.⁵⁹ In 1850, Joseph and Nancy were enumerated in the federal census in Adair County, Kentucky. He was fifty-two, born in North Carolina. She was forty-two born in Virginia. Also in the household, born in Kentucky, were Sarah E. (sixteen), Cyrus (fifteen), L.H. (male, fourteen), and Rebecca J. (nine).⁶⁰
- iii. BATRESS/BEATRICE JUDD, m. 1 August 1823, Adair County, Kentucky, JOSEPH OLIVER GENTRY.⁶¹
- iv. KESIAH/CUZZY/CUSSY JUDD, b. 1803, North Carolina;⁶² m. 21 August 1823, Adair County, Kentucky, JOSEPH CURRY.⁶³ In 1850, Kesiah and Joseph were enumerated in the federal census in

- Adair County, Kentucky. She was forty-seven, born in North Carolina. He was forty-nine, born in Kentucky. Their household also included John M. (twenty), Sarah A. (eighteen), Perry (sixteen), Jackson (sixteen), Myra (thirteen), Ermin (eleven), Amanda (eight), Jane (six), and Martha G. (four).⁶⁴

NATHAN² JUDD (*John*¹) was born 5 September 1807, according to his apprenticeship, but cemetery and census records put his birth date as March 1808, in Kentucky;⁷³ died March 1885, probably in Putnam County, Tennessee; buried in the Judd Cemetery, located southwest of the town of Cookeville, Putnam County, Tennessee.⁷⁴

Nathan married 2 August 1830, Adair County, Kentucky, **REBECCA N. GRIMES**.⁷⁵ She was born 23 June 1813, North Carolina;⁷⁶ died 27 April 1890, probably in Putnam County, Tennessee; buried in the Judd Cemetery, Putnam County, Tennessee.⁷⁷

A few months shy of Nathan's sixteenth birthday, on 24 May 1823, his father apprenticed him to John Anderson, a tanner in Columbus, Adair County, Kentucky. Nathan was to remain with Mr. Anderson until he was twenty. He was to labor and obey all lawful commands of Mr. Anderson and in turn to learn the "art and mystery" of tanning and currying of leather. During this time, Nathan was also to attend school. At the end of his apprenticeship, Mr. Anderson was to provide him with a new "decent suit of clothing" and \$10 cash.⁷⁸ Obviously, Nathan learned his trade well; he established a tannery southwest of Putnam County, Tennessee, long before 1854. The Judd tannery operated for nearly one hundred years.⁷⁹

Shortly after Nathan and Rebecca married in 1830, they must have left Adair County, Kentucky, as he only appeared in the Adair County personal property tax lists for the year 1830.⁸⁰

Nathan was enumerated in Jackson County, Tennessee, in 1840. His household included one male under 5 (John), one male 5-10 (Jacob), one male 30-40 (Nathan), two females under 5 (Emiliza and Letha), two females 5-10 (Sarah and Mary), and one female 20-30 (Rebecca).⁸¹

In 1850 Nathan, Rebecca, and their family were enumerated in the federal census Jackson County, Tennessee. Nathan was forty-two, born in Kentucky. He was a Methodist minister and owned \$600 worth of real estate. Rebecca was thirty-seven, born in North Carolina. Their household, all of whom were born in Tennessee except the eldest Sarah (seventeen) born in Kentucky, consisted of Mary (fifteen), John (thirteen), Emiliza (twelve), Lutha (eleven), William H. (nine), Harriet (eight), Mathias (six), Margaret (four), Joseph (two), Simon (two), Walter (six months), and Litus (six months).⁸²

Putnam County, Tennessee, was created in 1854 from the following Tennessee counties: White, Jackson, Overton, Smith, and Fentress. In 1850 Nathan was in Jackson County. He probably had not moved when the new county formed. In 1850, his real estate in Jackson County was valued at \$600,⁸³ but by 1860 and again in 1870 his real estate was valued at \$2,000.⁸⁴

Nathan purchased 175 acres for \$100 from Samuel Madwell in September 1857.⁸⁵ Nathan and Rebecca sold in 1880 to Nathan J. Judd, probably their son, property in Civil District #1, Putnam County, for \$300. There were conditions to this sale: Nathan Sr. was to have full control and possession of the dwelling house, other out buildings, the garden, and other lots containing about fifteen acres, orchard, plus free access to water and firewood. He was also to receive one quarter of all corn, wheat, and other products raised by Nathan J. The final condition was the Nathan J. could not sell any of the land without Nathan Sr.'s consent.⁸⁶

In April 1858, Nathan sold fifty acres to John E. Judd for \$200. Nathan's relationship to this John E. Judd is unknown.⁸⁷

In 1860, Nathan and Rebecca were enumerated in the federal census in Cookeville, Putnam County, Tennessee. Nathan was fifty-three, born in Kentucky. He was a tanner and he owned real estate worth \$2,000 and personal property worth \$500. Rebecca was forty-seven, born in North Carolina. Also in the household, born in Tennessee, were Letha (age twenty), William (age nineteen, farmer), Harriett (age seventeen), Mathias (age sixteen, farmer), Margaret (age fourteen), Joseph B. (age twelve), Simeon B. (age twelve), Walter W. (age ten), Silas J. (age ten), Stephen (age seven), Nathan (age six), Rebecca A. (age four), and Lois (age one).⁸⁸

David Whiteaker paid Nathan \$46 for seventy-five acres of land in Civil District #5 in Putnam County.⁸⁹ A John G. Judd and Elijah Judd jointly purchased thirty acres of land in Civil District #1 in December 1861.⁹⁰

Nathan and Rebecca's son Matthias served in the Union Army,⁹¹ and sons William and John moved to Adair County, Kentucky, where Nathan still had family living.⁹² They moved to avoid the conscript law of the South.⁹³ According to a Judd family history, son Jacob was "bushwhacked by a Confederate soldier in August 1865."⁹⁴

In June 1862 the United States Congress approved an act titled "An Act for Collection of Direct Taxes in Insurrectionary District within United States and for other purposes." Nathan was assessed a tax amounted of \$1.75 for 219 acres valued at \$500, failure to pay the tax fifty percent penalty was assessed.⁹⁵

In 1870, Nathan and Rebecca were enumerated in the federal census in Cookeville, Putnam County, Tennessee. Nathan was sixty-two, born in Kentucky. He was a farmer and owned \$2,000 worth of real estate and \$2,000 worth of personal property. Rebecca was fifty-six, born in North Carolina. Their household also included, all born in Tennessee, Litha (thirty-one), Margaret E. (twenty-four), Walley W. (twenty, farm worker), Stephen (eighteen, farm worker), Nathan (sixteen), Nancy (fourteen), and Lois (eleven). There were four other Judds in the household, Francis M. (thirteen), Sofrona (thirteen), John W. (nine), and William (one) born in Tennessee.⁹⁶

On 20 February 1880, Nathan and Rebecca sold to S.R. Judd, probably their son Simeon Robert, land also in Civil District #1 for \$100. There were also conditions to this sale: Nathan Sr. was to have full control of the tannery that was located on the property.⁹⁷

In 1880, Nathan and Rebecca were enumerated in the federal census in Putnam County. Nathan was seventy, born in Kentucky of parents born in North Carolina. He was a farmer. Rebecca was sixty-seven, born in North Carolina of parents also born in North Carolina. Their daughters, born in Tennessee, were Leatha (forty) and Louisa (twenty-one).⁹⁸

Nathan was also a Methodist Minister,⁹⁹ and according to a Judd family history, Nathan was a “circuit riding Methodist preacher,”¹⁰⁰ a tanner¹⁰¹ and a farmer.¹⁰²

Nathan “was ‘a mighty man in prayer’ and a ‘gifted singer.’ Descendants state that he was a man of robust health, energy and industry, and his wife was also strong physically, although a tiny woman, weighing only about 100 pounds. They reared their own eighteen children, plus three grandchildren.”¹⁰³

WILLIAM H.³ JUDD (*Nathan*², *John*¹) was born February 1841 in Tennessee;¹²⁷ died 4 March 1919, Putnam County, Tennessee, of mitral regurgitation; buried in Russell Cemetery, Putnam County, Tennessee.¹²⁸

William married about 1862, probably in Tennessee, LOUISA ANN LAFEVER, the daughter of Andrew and Celia Lafever.¹²⁹ Louisa was born June 1847 in Tennessee;¹³⁰ died 24 April 1925, Putnam County, Tennessee; buried in Russell Cemetery.¹³¹

William worked in his father's tanyard. According to Marcus Judd in *The Family of Wm. Henry Harrison Judd and Louisa Ann Lafever*, William and Louisa, along with William's older brother John and his wife moved from Putnam County, Tennessee, to Adair County, Kentucky, because of conflict in Putnam County over the Civil War and to avoid the conscription laws of the South.¹³² It doesn't appear that William and Louisa purchased land while living in Adair County.¹³³

On 8 February 1865 William H. and John Judd of Adair County, Kentucky, were assessed a 5 percent tax on \$37 in value of finished leather for a total tax of \$1.85.¹³⁴

The family returned to Tennessee after 1870, where William was a farmer.¹³⁵

In 1870, William and Louisa were enumerated in the federal census in Columbia, Adair County, Kentucky. William H. was twenty-nine, and born in Tennessee. He was a farmer and owned \$250 in personal property. Louisa was twenty-four, born in Tennessee. Also in the household, all born in Kentucky, were Nathan J. (seven), John M. (six), Andrew W. (three), and Jefferson Z. (eight months, born in October).¹³⁶

In 1880 William, Louisa, and their family were enumerated in the federal census twice. On June 17th, William and "Ann" were enumerated in the 2nd Civil District of Putnam County, Tennessee. William was thirty-nine, born in Tennessee. He was a farmer. Ann was thirty-four, born in Tennessee. Children were Nathan (seventeen, farm worker), John (sixteen, farm worker), Andrew (twelve, farm worker), Jefferson (ten, farm worker), born in Kentucky, and Joseph (eight, farm worker), Frances (five), Catherine (three), and Rebecca (one), born in Tennessee.¹³⁷ Then on June 25th, the family was enumerated in the 1st Civil District

also of Putnam County. William was thirty-nine, born in Tennessee. He was a farmer. L.A., wife, was thirty-four, born in Tennessee. Children, born in Tennessee, were N.J. (son, eighteen, farm worker), John M. (sixteen, farm worker), Andrew W. (twelve), Jefferson (ten), Joseph (seven), F.A. (son, six), L.C. (daughter, three), and Rebecca (one).¹³⁸

In 1900, William and Louisa were enumerated in the federal census in Putnam County, Tennessee. William was fifty-nine, born February 1841 in Tennessee, with his father born in Kentucky and his mother born in North Carolina. She was fifty-five, born June 1846 in Tennessee of parents born in Tennessee. They had been married thirty-eight years. She was the mother of thirteen children, twelve of whom were still living. They owned their farm, and William was a farmer. Children, born in Tennessee, were Rebeckie (age twenty-one, born September 1878), Celia (age nineteen, born April 1881), Harvey (age seventeen, born May 1883, farm laborer), William (age fourteen, born September 1885, farm laborer), and July A. (age ten, born November 1889).¹³⁹

On 3 February 1902 William and Louisa sold to J.W. Judd all the marketable timber of all kinds and descriptions located on 200 acres of land on the waters of Peter Case branch of the Falling Water [River], located in the 8th Civil District in Putnam County, Tennessee. Also with the sale of the timber, J.W. Judd was granted the right of way or easement over and across the property for the purpose of marketing the timber.¹⁴⁰ On this same date, William and Louisa received a note from J.W. Judd for \$118 due six months from that day for the sale of the same 200 acres where the timber was located. The couple retained the right to “use, live upon and occupy” the land during their lifetime rent free. They, in turn, would keep up repairs, pay the taxes, and not interfere with the J.W.’s right to cultivate the land.¹⁴¹

In 1910, William H. and Louisa A. were enumerated on Buffalo Valley Road in the 8th Civil District in Putnam County, Tennessee. William was sixty, born in Tennessee, with his father born in Kentucky and his mother born in North Carolina. Louisa was sixty-three, born in Tennessee of parents born in Tennessee. They had been married forty-eight years. She was the mother of thirteen children, eleven of whom were still living. Residing with them were their single daughter, Julia (age twenty, farm laborer), and two granddaughters, Sarah E. (age nine), and Marah (age nine).¹⁴²
